Alberta's Catholic School Districts: Meet Northern Alberta in the Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan

There are 17 Catholic School Districts in Alberta. As well, Alberta's four Francophone boards also offer Catholic education in specified schools. All in all, more than 183,500 students attend 450 Catholic schools in our province. Mark 5 of a Catholic School encourages us to build and share a communal spirit. In the spirit of community, GrACE encourages you to get to know more about Alberta's Catholic School Districts and their leaders.

In the month of January we introduce you to the four Catholic and Francophone school districts in the Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan: Grande Prairie and District Catholic Schools, Holy Family CRD and Living Waters CSSD. Serving Francophone students in this area is the Conseil scolaire du Nord-Ouest.

Grande Prairie & District Catholic Schools serve 5,600 students and currently operates 13 schools in the communities of Grande Prairie, Beaverlodge, Fairview, Sexsmith and Spirit River, with plans to open two new schools in the city of Grande Prairie in the fall of 2022.

Holy Family Catholic Regional Division serves 2,100 students in nine schools in the communities of McLennan, Peace River, Grimshaw, Valleyview, High Prairie and Manning.

Living Waters Catholic Separate School Division is actually part of three dioceses: Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan, Archdiocese of Edmonton and Diocese of St Paul due to the fact that its regional communities are located in three distinct regions. With 7 schools in the three communities of Whitecourt, Slave Lake and Edson, Living Waters Catholic serves 2,100 students.

Conseil scolaire du Nord-Ouest offers Francophone Catholic education in one Catholic school, Ecole Heritage in Falher. Ecole Heritage is a regional school, welcoming 155 students (Pre-K-12) from over 10 communities in the Peace and Smoky River region. The school community and school board collaborate with the local parish and diocese to enhance its Catholic programming.

About the Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan

Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan


The Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan was created by Pope Paul VI in 1967, as a gift to Canada on her centennial. Before becoming an archdiocese, it was the Apostolic Vicariate of Grouard (1927-1967), itself having been carved out of other Apostolic Vicariates. An apostolic vicariate can be understood as a missionary region which is reasonably expected to increase in population and financial self-support so as to become a diocese at some future time.

The scattered population, numerous isolated communities, and insufficient indigenous financial resources make us a missionary diocese still. For the time being, we rely on Catholic Missions in Canada, and the generosity of its donors, to be able to maintain our parish churches, missions, and priests.

The Catholic Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan encompasses about 225,000 sq. km. of northwestern Alberta. It extends from Valleyview in the south to High Level and Fort Vermilion in the north; and from Slave Lake in the east to the Alberta-BC border in the west. Another way to describe it is as covering the western half of Treaty Eight land.

Meet the Archbishop of Grouard-McLennan: Archbishop Gerard Pettipas

Archbishop Pettipas was born in Halifax, Nova Scotia. At the age of 26 he was ordained a priest on May 7, 1977 by Bishop Thomas Benjamin Fulton. He was appointed as archbishop of Grouard-McLennan by Pope Benedict XVI on November 30, 2006.



Book Recommendations from Archbishop Pettipas

Over the past year, these are some of the books I have used for my own spiritual reading and reflection. I share these not so much to recommend these particular works, but to encourage you to keep good reading close at hand.

- <u>Finding Christ in the Crisis: What the Pandemic Can Teach Us</u>. Written by Father Harrison Ayre, a young priest from Victoria BC and Michael Heinlein, writer and editor at Our Sunday Visitor Press in the US. A fine appreciation of how we might approach the pandemic from a spiritual point of view.
- <u>The Beatitudes and Woes of Jesus Christ</u>, by Father Joseph R. Jacobson. Most of us remember Fr. Joseph, from our own archdiocese. In this book, he uses the beatitudes from Matthew's Gospels (and the beatitudes and woes from Luke's Gospel) to reflect a conversation between the reader and God.
- For the more serious reader, but you need not be a theologian, is the trilogy of books on <u>Jesus of Nazareth</u> by Joseph Ratzinger Pope Benedict XVI needs no introduction. These are entitled <u>The Infancy Narratives</u>, <u>From the Baptism in the Jordan to the Transfiguration</u>, and <u>Holy Week: From the Entrance into Jerusalem to the Resurrection</u>. In size, these three works go from small, to medium, to large, but all three are filled with excellent insights.
- Still Green and Growing: A Practical Spirituality for the Second Half of Life, by Archbishop Sylvain Lavoie. Archbishop Lavoie writes from a background of Indigenous ministry, as well as many of the stumbling blocks that most of us experience: grief, faith and hope, addictions, death.
- <u>Le Saint Enseignant: Jean-Baptiste de la Salle, saint patron des éducateurs</u>, by George Van Grieken, FSC. This biography, in French, tells of the trials and triumphs of the founder of the Brothers of Christian Schools in France in the 1600s, and his innovations in the formation of teachers for poor boys in northeastern France.

At Ecole St. Joseph (Gr. 4-12) in Whitecourt we were initially challenged by not being able to sing. However, an Educational Assistant, Laurie Martinot, shared her talents and came up with the idea of a Christmas Concert that used sign language to share the message of faith and joy. This was a unique and inclusive approach that allowed the school to make a new tradition, while honoring the spirit of the season.

The students and staff of Living Waters have shown that they will meet the challenges of the pandemic with creativity and community. Toward this end, our advent service projects had a focus on giving to our own communities. Whether creating hampers for families within our schools or participating in clothing drives, the Living Waters Family stepped up to share our good fortune with others. In the end, we modeled Mark 5 by demonstrating that when life is difficult we are stronger together, even if we have to remain physically apart. Faith is alive and we continue to model the way forward. After all, the early Christians faced significant challenges. The pandemic does not need to be a barrier to faith, but could be viewed as a force for creativity and building new traditions. Catholic Education is funded through education property taxes, grants and general provincial revenue.

Taxes declared in support of the Catholic separate school district in your municipality benefit your children.

Your taxes support Catholic Education by:

- Recognizing and affirming the constitutional right of Catholic separate school boards to requisition municipalities for education taxes.
- Maintaining a vital connection between school boards and their electors. Taxation serves as a means of accountability for school trustees to provide quality education to those in their local communities, including those without schoolaged children.
- Providing a stable source of funding for public education and allowing for a public declaration of support by electors for Catholic Education.

To ensure your property taxes are supporting your Catholic separate school:

- Declare your school support as "separate" on your annual property assessment notice and tax bill. If a declaration of school support is not filed by a property owner, the property assessment and tax bills are directed to the public school district.
- To change your support designation, complete and submit a School Support Declaration form, obtained from your local city, town or municipal office.

Check your property bill to confirm your support for Catholic education!
